

Canaan Elementary Students Step Up with 100-Mile Walking Club

At Canaan Elementary School, students are putting on their boots, hats, mittens and warm winter jackets to take strides toward a healthier lifestyle. The newly launched 100-Mile Walking Club encourages physical fitness, teamwork, and perseverance, as it challenges young walkers to complete 100 miles during the remainder of the school year.

Monday through Thursday students walk laps in the field before the school day begins. Open to all students, participants include kindergarten to fifth graders, ensuring that everyone can join in no matter their age or athletic ability.

"We wanted to create an opportunity for students to be active and set a personal goal they could work toward," said Mrs. Whittemore, a sentiment echoed by Mrs. Bellerose and the first-grade teachers who organized this initiative.

The walking club has quickly become a favorite activity, with students proudly tracking their progress on papers in their classrooms. Milestone markers, such as reaching 10, 25, 50, and 75 miles, are celebrated with t-shirts, small prizes, or special recognition during our monthly Student of the Month assemblies. In January, 33 students were recognized with reaching the 25-mile mark since the program started the first week of December.

"We're proud of the effort every student is putting in," said Mrs. Bellerose. "It's amazing to see how this simple challenge has helped foster a sense of community and encouraged healthy habits."



"Core Values" Focus at Elementary Schools



Each month North Elementary, Bloomfield and Margaret Chase Smith Schools celebrate students and their amazing ability to demonstrate our schools' core values: compassion, self-control, generosity, service, resilience, uniqueness, cooperation, hope, and initiative

Through school-wide assemblies and classroom activities, students learn the meaning and application of a different value each month. All schools use supporting materials including an animal to represent the value, a giant poster, an informational video, and a music video with song and dance moves. Teachers in all three schools weave the themes into their daily routines, and all schools award "Hawk Slips" to students who demonstrate the current and past core values. Below are some further details about how each school integrates these values into their school communities.

North Elementary kindergarteners meet monthly to introduce that month's core value. Learning about

the animal creates a strong connection for our young learners, and we discuss ways we may see a student showing the value. To end our monthly assembly, we reward last month's Core Value Student of the Month. Each student of the month recieved a medal, takes a picture with their teacher, and has a pizza party with Mrs. Madore that includes a special dessert! Also, the classroom with the most Hawk Slips gets an extra recess hosted by Mrs. Madore. Our guidance counselor, Mrs. Goggin, highlights the core value in her lessons, and staff regularly remind students of the core values and how they can



demonstrate them.

The students at **Bloomfield** meet monthly in two blended community groups to learn about the new core value. Together we dance to the new video and song, and we celebrate the students who exhibited the core value of the month with a certificate and bag of popcorn. Students love coming to the assembly to celebrate together. Our lobby is decorated with the core value posters as well as pictures of the Core Value Students of the Month on our bulletin board. Ms. Labbe, the school counselor, sprinkles the core values into her classroom visits as well; and students "caught" exhibiting positive behaviors earn Hawkslips, which can be used to shop at the school store. Recognizing students for the positive behaviors and routinely reviewing the core values themes helps build friendships at BES and creates a positive experience for students.

At Margaret Chase Smith School, students gather monthly to celebrate the previous month's Core Value Student of the Month and Move More Kids winners. During the assembly, students are introduced to the new value through a presentation that includes a music video, interactive discussions with peers, reading aloud, and other engaging activities. Core

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value student winners are recognized with a medal, certificate, Student of the Month pencil, and a choice of a 3D-printed item. Additionally, our guidance counselor, Mrs. Goggin, incorporates the core value into her lessons, while staff reinforce it throughout the month. As part of our ongoing commitment to positive behavior, students demonstrating core values can earn Hawkslips, which enter them into a weekly prize drawing—a fun way to celebrate their efforts in

Kindergarten Teachers Using "Jolly Phonics"



Most kindergarten teachers are using Jolly Phonics as part of their literacy program this year. Jolly Phonics is a fun, multisensory approach that focuses on teaching children the sounds of letters and letter combinations, rather than just their names. By learning these sounds, children can begin to decode (read) and encode (spell) words more easily. The program uses a combination of visual, auditory, and kinesthetic techniques, such as games and songs, to help children grasp these concepts in an engaging way.

Key Features

- 1. Letter Sounds: We start by teaching 42 sounds that letters make. These sounds are linked to stories, songs, and actions, which make learning fun and memorable.
- 2. Blending: Once children know the sounds, they learn to blend them together to read words, helping them build reading confidence.
- 3. Segmenting: Children learn to break words down into their individual sounds, which is essential for spelling.
- 4. Tricky Words: Children are introduced to "tricky words" that don't follow regular phonetic rules. These are taught alongside the sounds to help with reading fluency.

Jolly Phonics has proven to be a highly effective method for helping our children become confident readers and writers. We are excited about the progress students are making this year.

Jolly Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling is also being used in several first and second-grade classrooms, and they too are seeing great results.

SAHS Seniors "Adopt" an Elementary Classroom

In December, Skowhegan Area High School seniors made a heartwarming return to their adopted third and fourth-grade classrooms, much to the excitement of the younger students who had been eagerly awaiting their visit. Students worked together on winter crafts and discussed the differences and similarities between high school and elementary school life, providing an opportunity for seniors to forge a meaningful connection with the younger students as they shared their experiences and offered advice. The seniors will visit again in February for a more formal task: being interviewed



by the elementary students to gather information for their Maine College Circle Aspirations Scholarship essays.

Prioritizing Student Attendance at SAMS

During the 2023-2024 school year, Skowhegan Area Middle School analyzed trends in attendance and unexcused absences. This work led to the creation of a team, which includes the SAMS school nurse and a guidance counselor, that meets weekly to review attendance and considers the medical, social, and mental health factors that may contribute to absenteeism.

To identify patterns and encourage attendance, we started this school year by sending home letters to families of students who had missed three days of school. The letters were sent home, regardless of the reason for the absences, to ensure a consistent message from the school to home

The initial letters helped to identify students at risk for high absenteeism, which would negatively impact their grades and learning. From there, we held many meetings to identify barriers to regular school attendance and then provided support to families of students who reported anxiety or physical illness. In some cases, transportation needs were identified and addressed.

These initial letters opened the conversation about attendance and its importance. As a result of our efforts, we have drastically decreased our truancy numbers and improved daily attendance.

We highlight these positive improvements at our monthly assemblies by recognizing those with perfect attendance, identifying "Attendance Rising Stars," and applauding the team with the overall best attendance.

Great Things Happening at SAHS

Skowhegan Area High School has a lot to be proud of. Be it rigorous academics, a state champion speech team, or competitive athletic teams in every season, great things always seem to be happening.

Some of what we are most proud of, however, may be a little less visible. Over the last two years, SAHS has been offering every student deep and meaningful educational opportunities, both inside and outside of the classroom. Currently, we are organizing for our third-annual Freshmen Community Service Day, our second Sophomore Job Shadow Day, and our first Junior College Visit Day. These exciting days will allow students to give back to our communities and explore possibilities for after graduation.



In January, we started the "River Hawk Homework Hangout." The Hangout is a place where our students can complete homework assignments with their friends; receive tutoring support in social studies, science, math, and English; or receive help with credit recovery. The River Hawk Homework Hangout meets from 2:30-4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons. Regional bus transportation is provided for students.

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Overview of Your MSAD 54 Budget

With the shifting landscape at both the State and Federal Government, it is important to understand how our school budget and school funding works.

Our Values: The MSAD 54 School Board works incredibly hard to provide high quality educational experiences for our students, while maintaining a fiscally conservative approach to budgeting that has limited the impact to local property taxpayers over time.

Our Budget: State, Local, Federal, and other funds (grants, etc.) all contribute. These areas represent four legs of a stool. If the height of any of the legs of that stool changes, the stool begins to wobble.

State Valuation: Our district's local funding formula is 100% based on state valuation, which means the shifts seen by towns are entirely attributable to the increase or decrease in a town's wealth as determined by the State of Maine.

Fixed Costs: This year's budget includes several fixed costs from the state level. The increases from the Maine Paid Family and Medical Leave law, retirement plans, and the mandated minimum pay for hourly support staff, among others, add up to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Employee Costs/New School: Employee costs make up 85.66% of MSAD 54's budget after backing out the 100% state funded bonds for the Mill Stream and the Margaret Chase Smith Community School (MCSCS). Thanks to a tremendous local fundraising effort, the district budget for the MCSCS construction project includes \$0 of local costs; in fact, the project has helped reduce costs in the budget through the consolidation of our schools.

FY26 Draft Status Quo Budget: The FY26 draft budget is up 2.346% locally and includes significant across-the-board cuts. The School Board has worked very hard to keep costs down over the years; over the last 7 years the local average impact is 2.171% annually, both lower than inflation and tax increases from other areas.

FY26 Note: The FY26 Budget includes \$1,520,452 in State Funds dedicated to the New School (\$867,937) and CTE (\$652,515) which are each 100% state funded and have no local impact. The budget is up 2.346% otherwise.
